Alumni Giving

ALUMNI AND FRIENDS of Yale Law School provide vital support that sustains the excellence and vision of our School. In 2013–2014, YLS received gift commitments from 3,738 donors totaling \$36,825,137, and cash contributions from 4,579 donors totaling \$15,287,202. The generosity of our loyal alumni who celebrated Reunions in 2014 was responsible for a significant portion of the total raised. Classes of 1954, 1959, 1964, 1974, 1979, and 1989 are recognized for each having raised reunion gifts surpassing more than \$1 million! Yale Law School extends its heartfelt gratitude to all those who made gifts—large or small—and contributed in a meaningful way to the current needs of the Law School.

Law Firm Alumni Rise to the Challenge

THE YLS LAW FIRM CHALLENGE PROGRAM is a friendly competition that promotes financial support of the Yale Law School Fund by alumni at leading law firms. Now in its fifth year, the program emphasizes participation in the Law School Fund and the impact of alumni donations.

The chart below provides the results from fiscal year 2013–2014. Overall, thirty-six firms participated in the challenge, which represented a total of 951 alumni. The overall participation rate was 63 percent (an increase from 53 percent last year) with a participation rate of 72 percent among all partners (an increase from 64 percent last year) and 51 percent among all associates (an increase from 35 percent last year).

Wachtell Lipton: First place in Group 2 (twenty to thirty-four alumni) with an overall participation rate of 100 percent.

Keker & Van Nest and **Norton Rose Fulbright**: Tied for first place in Group 3 (ten to nineteen alumni) with an overall participation rate of 100 percent.
